THEODORE ROOSEVELT His Life Reviewed in Pictures

Theodore Roosevelt, whose one hundredth birthday anniversary is being celebrated this year, was 26th President of the United States. He is remembered by his countrymen as a crusader for the rights of minorities, a friend of the laboring man; a writer, conservationist and explorer; a devoted family man, a dynamic President and a realistic idealist. He brought about successful mediation between management and labor; legislated against corporation monopolies; established Federal commissions to guard the public welfare and instigated a far-reaching program for conservation of the country's natural resources. Born October 27, 1858, he died at the age of 60 at his home in Oyster Bay, New York.

Actuando como mediador, el presidente Roosevelt fué el instrumento que trajo a conclusión satisfactoria el tratado de paz que puso fin a la guerra ruso-japonesa. Le vemos aquí con los representantes de dos naciones en Portsmouth, New Hampshire, donde fué firmado el tratado. Sus esfuerzos para poner fin a la guerra ganaron para él el premio Nobel de 1906, siendo el primer americano así honrado.
