The United States is conducting its 17th decennial census this year (1950), and the apportionment of representatives from each State to the United States Congress will be determined by the population count. In addition, the census will be a source for statistics on housing and agriculture. Final reports, published at the end of the census year, are used for long-range business, industrial, agricultural and civic planning.

Census Bureau officials estimate that the U.S. population will be more than 150,000,000. Among those interviewed on the first day of the census (April 1, 1950) were Harry S. Truman, President of the United States, his wife (center) and their daughter Margaret (right). They are shown with an entrepreneur at Key West, in the southern State of Florida, where the Chief Executive and his family were vacationing. (SD-62532.
