

President Harry S. Truman of the United States recently dedicated the Chapel of the Four Chaplains in Philadelphia, Pennsylvania, built to honor four military chaplains who died during World War II that others might live. The chaplains, a Roman Catholic priest, a Jewish Rabbi, and two Protestant ministers, gave their lives when the troopship Dorchester was torpedoed and sunk in the Atlantic Ocean in 1945. They gave their life preservers to soldiers, Joined hands in prayer, and went down with the ship.
