One hundred years ago, the United States Congress passed the Land-Grant Act, giving birth to a vast system of colleges and universities that would be "open and accessible to the poorest boy for girl in the land." Shown in these pictures is Cornell University, one of the sixty-eight land-grant institutions that have contributed much to education, not only in the United States but also in many other countries.

Charged with educating future farmers, early land-grant professors found they first had to write the textbooks of scientific agriculture.
