The daily activities around the Lincoln Memorial in Washington, D. C. a shrine erected by a grateful Nation, are typical of those he would see in America today.

11-11. The Lincoln Memorial faces Arlington National Cemetery, across the Potomac River. Here are the graves of men who died in their country's wars, whose sacrifice is measured in these words from Lincoln's eloquent address on the battlefield at Gettysburg, Pennsylvania on November 19, 1863: "... we here highly resolve that these dead shall not have died in vain; that this nation under God shall have a new birth of freedom, and that government of the people, by the people and for the people shall not perish from the earth."
