



PRESIDENT EISENHOWER VIEWS PICTURES FROM TIROS I SATELLITE -- President Eisenhower examines the sequence of photographs received from Tiros I, the U.S. meteorological satellite, during its second orbit around the earth. At right is Dr. T. Keith Glennan, director of the National Aeronautics and Space Administration (NASA). "I think it is a marvelous development," Mr. Eisenhower said. The photos were received by television at Fort Monmouth, New Jersey and were forwarded to NASA headquarters in Washington by telephone. Tiros stands for "television and infra-red observation satellite." However, Tiros I does not carry an infra-red sensor. A second Tiros, scheduled later this year, will be equipped with such a sensor to measure atmospheric temperature as the satellite sweeps around the earth. (60-5523)
