ANCESTRAL HOME OF FRANKLIN D. POOSEVELT (DO NOT RELEASE BEFORE APRIL 12, 1945)

The ancestral home of the late Franklin Delano Roosevelt, thirty-first President of the United States, at Hyde Park, New York, becames a Wational Historic Site on April 12, 1946, the first anniversary of the Chief Executive's death. The site, on the east shore of the Hudson River, is about five miles north of Poughkeepsie, approximately midway between New York City and Albaby, capital of New York State.

President Marry S. Truman will deliver the principal dedication speech. Mrs. Eleanor Rossevelt, widow of the President, will deliver an address denating the property to the government and Julius A. Kruy, Secretary of the U.S. Department of the interior will accept the gift in behalf of his department. Among the many people attending the dedication decremonies will be several number personages from all over the world who will be pesent as specially invited guests.

Although the late President reserved for Mrs. Roosevelt and their children a life interest in the estate. It of them waived their rights so that the government have immediate and unencumbered possession of the 33-acre site as an historia site belonging to the people of the United States.

Above the mantel hangs a Gilbert Stuart portrait of least Roosevelt, great-great grandfather of the late President.
