

STATE OF THE WORLD -- "Peace depends on the ability of great powers to ^{C-102F3} live together on the same planet despite differences," President Richard Nixon tells U.S. legislators and the American people in his 1972 State of the Union message. Speaking before a joint session of the Congress at the Capitol in Washington, he said that the nation's commitment to freedom "remains strong and unshakable" but "others must bear their share of the burden of defending freedom around the world." The address was broadcast on radio and television.
